Columbia School District's Safe Return to School Guidelines for the 2021-2022 School Year





The Columbia School District has developed Safe Return to School Guidelines utilizing the guidance and recommendations of health officials and addressing public comments/input. CSD's guidelines align with the reopening guidelines and district guidance on the development of a safe return to inperson instruction and continuity of services plan provided by our state and/or federal leaders. CSD's purpose is to prioritize the health and safety of students and staff as we return to face-to-face instruction for the 2021-2022 School year. CSD's recovery focuses heavily on the health and physical requirements necessary for returning safely to school. Each school has created a clear and precise reentry plan to navigate the academic, social, and emotional effects of the COVID-19 pandemic. Our focus remains on our students, staff, and families. CSD supports COVID-19 vaccinations for educators, staff, and students, if eligible.



Transporting Students



School buildings are closed; buses are used to deliver meals to students and families

District/School Plan:

 Reduce contact by delivering a schedule of meals during a designated time (ex: delivering two days' worth of meals every other day)

District/School Plan:

- Provide hand sanitizer for students and bus drivers
- Provide face masks for bus drivers; require students to wear face masks/coverings
- Students will screen at home for symptoms of illness prior to arrival at the bus stop and utilize spaced seating (to the extent practicable)
- Eliminate field trips
- Clean and disinfect the bus after each route
- Establish protocols for bus stops, loading/unloading students to minimize congregation of children from different households

What Bus Operators Need to Know

District/School Plan:

- Implement standard operating procedures while taking preventative measures such as:
 - Providing hand sanitizer for students and bus drivers
 - Allowing bus drivers and students to wear facemasks/coverings
 - Limiting field trips (to areas of limited/low transmission)
 - Inspecting buses prior to students returning and as part of a regular rotation
 - Cleaning and disinfecting frequently touched surfaces on the bus at least daily
 - o Airing out buses when not in use

Entering School Buildings



School buildings are closed; require only essential staff reportin-person to carry outfunctions that are absolutely necessary.

District/School Considerations:

- District/school leaders will determine roles, responsibilities, and reporting requirements for staff.
- District/school leaders will utilize virtual platforms wherever possible to conductessential business and keep in-person reporting to an absolute minimum during schoolclosures.

District/School Plan:

- Post signage in classrooms, hallways, and entrances to communicate how to stop the spread. COVID-19 symptoms, preventative measures (including staying home when sick), good hygiene, and school/district specific protocols.
- Establish a protocol for students/staff who feel ill/experience symptoms when they come to school (see When a Child, Staff Member, or Visitor Becomes Sick at School)
- Mark spaced lines to enter the building and designate entrance and exit flow paths
- Screen students and staff (to the extent practicable):
 - Isolate and send home if internal temperature over 100.4°F (38°C)
 - Consider safety and privacy concerns (confidentiality should be maintained)
- Establish a protocol for visitors: calling front office before entering, screening visitors, require use of face coverings/masks, etc. Restrict nonessential visitors and volunteers.
- Establish a protocol for student pick/drop up: staggered entry and release (by grade, class, or bus numbers), marked spacing for pickup

District/School Plan:

- Implement standard operating procedures while taking preventative measures such as:
 - Provide hand sanitizer for students and staff
 - Limit unnecessary congregations of students and staff
 - Post signage in classrooms, hallways, and entrances to communicate how to stop the spread. COVID-19 symptoms, preventative measures (including staying home when sick), good hygiene, and school/district specific protocols
 - Establish a protocol for students/staff who feel ill/experience symptoms when they come to school (see When a Child, Staff Member, or Visitor Becomes Sick at School)
 - Establish a protocol for visitors: calling front office before entering, screening visitors, requesting use of face coverings/masks, etc.

¹ Vulnerable Populations --Elderly individuals and/or individuals with serious underlying health conditions, including high blood pressure, chronic lung disease, diabetes, obesity, asthma, and those whose immune system is compromised such as by chemotherapy for cancer and other conditions requiring such therapy.

School buildings are closed.

District/School Plan:

- Provide remote/distance learning opportunities for vulnerable student populations in consultation with parents and public health officials
- Adhere to FERPA and HIPPA requirements
- Adhere to state and federal employment law and extended leave allowances
- Offer an Employee Assistance Program to all staff members

District/School Plan:

- Implement standard operating procedures while taking preventative measures such as:
 - Provide hand sanitizer for students and staff
 - ProvidePPEtovulnerablestudents and staff as appropriate
 - Allow vulnerable students to complete their coursework virtually
 - Allow vulnerable students and staff to wear PPE throughout the school day (to the extent practicable)
 - Limit large group gatherings/ Interactions for vulnerable students and staff



When a Child, Staff Member, or Visitor Becomes Sick at School



District/School Plan:

- Create an isolation room or area to separate anyone who exhibits COVID-like symptoms.
- School nurses will utilize *Standard and Transmission-Based Precautions* when caring for sick people.
- Establish procedures for safely transporting anyone who is sick home or to a healthcare facility.
- Notify local health officials, staff, and families immediately of a
 possible case while maintaining confidentiality consistent with
 the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and other applicable
 federal and state privacy laws.
- Close off areas used by a sick person and do not use before cleaning and disinfection.
- Inform sick staff members and children not to return until they have met CDC/MSDH criteria to discontinue home isolation
- Inform those who have had close contact to a person diagnosed with COVID-19 to stay home and follow state CDC/ MSDH guidance if symptoms develop. If a person does not have symptoms, follow appropriate state guidance for home quarantine.
